The Kane County Juvenile Justice Center participated in the Feed My Starving Children MobilePack on September 5, 2018. The following are the details of our shipment:


 72 boxes (15,552 meals) have shipped to Haiti through their partner, World Help, Inc.

The JJC is excited to announce that we are the recipient of a USDA Farm to School grant. The Kane County Development and Community Services Department obtained this grant in an effort to provide additional food services and opportunities for the kids in juvenile detention. This includes the procurement of local produce and foods, as well as pairing with the county's goal of addressing healthy eating and nutritional deficiencies. The grant will provide classroom learning components, as well as hands-on gardening activities. This includes the purchase of raised beds, as well as garden towers. The JJC has partnered with the Kane County Master Gardeners, Seven Generations Ahead and the Illinois Farm to School Network and Regional Office of Education to provide technical resources and networking.



HISET.

The **HiSET** Exam is now available at the JJC.

The HiSET® exam is one of three tests the United States and its territories use to measure high school equivalency skills. The HiSET® exam gives out-of-school youth an opportunity to demonstrate their skills and knowledge and earn a state-issued high school equivalency (HSE) credential. Once the youth passes the test, a high school equivalency certificate or high school equivalency diploma is issued. The HiSet Exam is an option for students who will be remaining at the JJC for an extended period and who have been identified by the JJC's education department as strong candidates to take the test.

Thanks to Dee Oliver and Phil Morris from the Regional Office of Education for making GED testing a possibility at the JJC. Thanks also to Liz Whittaker, who has been tutoring the residents, as well as Michele Celozzi for conducting the testing.

Thank you to Mike Davis, JJC Superintendent, and Pam Ely, JJC PREA Coordinator/Program Manager, for their continued support.

The JJC is pleased to announce that our first resident in the program has successfully passed the Language Arts – Reading part of the test!
